# Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

## Statement of intent

Our statement of intent is based on cutting edge educational research into the science of learning (including how memory works) and character development. The statement of intent also aims to develop active citizens who have a strong understanding of the world around them and a desire and drive to positively impact their academy, local, national and global community.

We want our children (irrespective of their background or challenges) to:

- Be inspired to improve the world around them.
- Have the ambition, skills and expertise to thrive in a fast changing, interconnected and communication rich world, with the confidence and technical expertise to thrive.
- Have a network that supports them.
- Be comfortable in who they are and able to continuously explore who they are becoming.
- Be rich in language with a passion for learning.
- Seek to include others, be other-centred and celebrate difference.
- Have a values approach to life and a sense of what is right and wrong through the lived experience of the 9 Habits

Our approach will be adaptive, responsive and robust. We will analyse data rigorously to ensure that no child falls through the net. Our key areas of focus are:

- Increase the number of Year 1 and 2 pupils reaching the expected standard in the phonics check, to be above the national average.
- English attainment in KS2 impacting on combined achievement.
- SEND progress in Reading

Closing the attainment gap between disadvantaged children and their peers is the greatest challenge facing the academy. Adopting a whole school approach, in which all staff take responsibility for disadvantaged pupils outcomes and raise expectations of what they can achieve.

## Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	<p><b>Disadvantage phonics, oral language skills and vocabulary gaps</b></p> <p>Assessments, observations and discussions with pupils suggest disadvantage pupils generally have greater difficulties with phonics than their peers. This negatively impacts their development as readers.</p> <p>In 2022/23, 94% of non-PP children passed their phonics screening compared to 59% of PP children, showing the extent of this challenge for disadvantaged pupils.</p> <p>In 2024/25 93% of PP children passed their PSC compared to 76% of non-disadvantaged children, showing the significant improvement over time.</p>
2	<p><b>Well-being of students</b></p> <p>Our observations indicate that the education and well-being of many of our pupils have been impacted by partial school closures. National studies have shown this has had a greater impact on our disadvantaged pupils.</p> <p>Many of our children have multiples ACEs which affect their learning, mental and emotional wellbeing.</p>
3	<p><b>Lack of cultural capital experiences for disadvantaged pupils</b></p> <p>From pupil voice, we have gathered that many disadvantaged pupils have lacked cultural capital experiences at home. This can lead to lower oral language skills and gaps in vocabulary as well as lack of imagination.</p>
4	<p><b>Supporting disadvantage families</b></p> <p>Our observations through safeguarding and early help support indicate that our families require further support in areas such as housing, finance management and parenting support. We are also aware that some of our parents are unable to read and write and therefore struggle to provide support with learning at home.</p> <p>This has resulted in pupils being subject to home environments which are not conducive to thriving in education. This has resulted in significant gaps leading to pupils falling further behind age-related expectations.</p>
5	<p><b>Attendance</b></p> <p>Our attendance data in 2023/24 indicated that attendance among disadvantage pupils was 2% lower than for non-disadvantage pupils. Our disadvantaged pupils are currently 3.4% below national disadvantaged pupils with a figure of 91.9%.</p> <p>Our assessments and observations indicate that absenteeism is negatively impacting disadvantaged pupils' progress.</p> <p>In the academic year 2024/25 attendance of PP children was 94.2% and non PP was 95% showing the gap is closing.</p>

## Intended outcomes

## Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

### Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2022 to 2023 academic year.

#### Outcomes for disadvantaged pupils 2022/23:

In Reading the percentage reaching the expected standard went from 59% to 65%. In Writing the percentage of children the expected standard went from 63% to 65%. In Maths the percentage of children the expected standard went from 63% to 70%. In Reading, Writing and Maths combined the percentage of children the expected standard went from 47% to 54%.
